

Supplies: Printable pattern pieces, ½ yard of cotton fabric for top (makes 3), ½ yard chenille or terry cloth for backing, Kam snaps and applicator, coordinating thread

## Instructions:

1. Print and assemble pattern. Yours will look prettier than mine! Cut your cotton bib top fabric on the fold. Don't cut out the back yet. Trust me on this one. I've made hundreds of these!



2. Place your bib top on top of the backing fabric rights sides together and pin in place around the outside and the neck hole. Mark a 2" hole at the bottom to leave open for turning. Cut around the outside; don't worry about trimming too close. We'll clean it up later.



3. Starting at the top, just to the right of the center crease, sew around the outside of the bib, using a ¼" seam allowance. When you get to the bottom corner, increase your seam allowance to % unless you want to slip stitch your bib closed. Leave a 2" hole for turning in the bottom of the bib, and when you get to the other bottom corner resume the ¼" seam allowance. When the front of your foot reaches your starting point, pivot and sew down the neck piece, and then around the neck hole, finally ending right where you started.



4. Trim corners and all edges to ¼ ". Remove center neck circle. Snip round neckline to just before the stitch line.



5. Turn bib right side out through the bottom hole. Use a chopstick to press out seams. Press bib, carefully lining up the front and back fabrics to hide the hole and pin. Topstich all the way around.



6. Mark snap placement and attach snaps. You will need one male and 3 females.





## You did it!



Now mix it up a little by adding baby safe trims, or try the next one using pin tucking or color blocking (add seam allowance for mods!).
